4. First-aid Measures

Inhalation: If inhaled, remove to fresh air. If not breathing, give artificial respiration. Get medical attention.

Ingestion: DO NOT INDUCE VOMITING or give anything by mouth to an unconscious person. If more than 1 mg/kg of petroleum distillates are swallowed, remove by gastric ravage by qualified medical personnel. If vomiting occurs, keep person's head lower than hips to help prevent pulmonary aspiration. After vomiting stops, give 30-60 ml of Fleet's Phosphor-Soda diluted 1:4 in water. Get medical attention immediately.

Skin Contact: Remove contaminated clothing. Wipe off excess oil with a dry cloth and then wash affected area with soap or mild detergent and large amounts of water until no evidence of chemical remains (at least 20 minutes.) Get medical attention.

Eye Contact: Check for and remove any contact lenses. Flush eyes immediately with copious amounts of water, occasionally lifting upper and lower lids until no evidence of chemical remains (approximately 15-20 minutes.) Get medical attention.

Protection of First Responders: No action shall be taken involving any personal risk or without suitable training. If it is suspected that fumes are still present, the rescuer should wear an appropriate mask or self-contained breathing apparatus. It may be dangerous to the person providing aid to give mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Wash contaminated clothing thoroughly with water before removing it, or wear gloves.

Note to Physician: No specific treatment. Treat symptomatically. Contact poison treatment specialist immediately if large quantities have been ingested or inhaled.

5. Fire-fighting Measures

Fire: Flammable Liquid and Vapor! Vapor can cause flash fire.

Explosion: Combustible liquid. In a fire or if heated, a pressure increase will occur and the container may burst, with the risk of a subsequent explosion. Do not mix or store with strong oxidants. Do not store or pour near sources of ignition. Do not pressurize, cut, heat, weld, or expose empty containers to sources of ignition. Vapors are heavier than air and may travel a considerable distance to a source of ignition and flash back.

Fire Extinguishing Media: Foam, Carbon Dioxide, dry chemical, for larger fires use water spray, fog, or foam.

Special Information: Fire-fighters should wear appropriate protective equipment and self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) with a full face-piece operated in positive pressure mode. Runoff to sewer may create fire or explosion hazard. Soaked rags or spill absorbents (i.e. oil dry, polypropylene socks, sand, etc.) can cause spontaneous combustion if stored near combustibles and not handled properly. Store soaked rags or spill absorbents in approved safety containers and dispose of properly.

6. Accidental Release Measures

Personal Precautions, Protective Equipment and Emergency Procedures: No action shall be taken involving any personal risk or without suitable training. Evacuate surrounding areas. Keep unnecessary and unprotected personnel from entering. Do not touch or walk through spilled material. Shut off all ignition sources. No flares, smoking or flames in hazard area. Avoid breathing vapor or mist. Provide adequate ventilation. Wear appropriate respirator when ventilation is inadequate. Put on appropriate personal protective equipment as per Section 8.

Environmental Precautions and Methods and Materials for Containment and Cleaning Up: Avoid dispersal of spilled material and runoff and contact with soil, waterways, drains and sewers. Inform the relevant authorities if the product has caused environmental pollution (sewers, waterways, soil or air.)

If properly trained, proceed with the following measures:

1. For small spills: Stop leak if without risk. Move containers from spill area. Dilute with water and mop up if water-soluble or absorb with an inert dry material and place in an appropriate waste disposal container. Use spark-proof tools and explosion-proof equipment. Dispose of via a licensed waste disposal contractor.
2. For large spills: Stop leak if without risk. Move containers from spill area. Approach release from upwind. Dike far ahead of spills to prevent entry into sewers, water courses, ground water, basements or confined areas. Wash spillages into an effluent treatment plant or proceed as follows. Contain and collect spillage with non-combustible, absorbent material (e.g. sand, earth, vermiculite or diatomaceous earth) and place in container for disposal according to local regulations (see Section 13.) Use spark-proof tools and explosion-proof equipment. Dispose of via a licensed waste disposal contractor. Contaminated absorbent material may pose the same hazard as the spilled product.

7. Handling and Storage

Precautions for Safe Handling and Conditions for Safe Storage, Including Any Incompatibilities:

Protect against physical damage and excessive temperatures. Keep in the original container or an approved alternative made from a compatible material, kept tightly closed when not in use. Store and use away from heat, sparks, open flame or any other ignition source. Use explosion-proof electrical (ventilating, lighting and material handling) equipment. Use non-sparking tools. Take precautionary measures against electrostatic discharges. To avoid fire or explosion, dissipate static electricity during transfer by grounding and bonding containers and equipment before transferring material. Empty containers retain product residue and can be hazardous. Do not reuse container.

Store in accordance with local regulations. Store in a segregated and approved area. Store in original container protected from direct sunlight in a dry, cool and well-ventilated area, away from incompatible materials (see Section 10) and food and drink. Eliminate all ignition sources. Separate from oxidizing materials. Keep container tightly closed and sealed until ready for use. Containers that have been opened must be carefully resealed and kept upright to prevent leakage. Do not store in unlabeled containers. Use appropriate containment to avoid environmental contamination.

Special slow load procedures for "switch loading" must be followed to avoid the static ignition hazard that can exist when this product is loaded into tanks previously containing low flash point products (such as gasoline) - see API Publication 2003, "Protection Against Ignitions Arising Out Of Static, Lightning and Stray Currents."

10. Stability and Reactivity

Reactivity and / or Chemical Stability: Stable under ordinary conditions of use and storage at normal temperatures and pressures. Flammable liquid and vapor. Vapor can cause flash fire.

Possibility of Hazardous Reactions and Conditions to Avoid: Heat, flames, ignition sources and incompatibles.

Incompatible Materials: May explode or react violently when exposed to oxidizing materials and alkalis.

Hazardous Decomposition Products: The use of hydrocarbon fuels in an area without adequate ventilation may result in hazardous levels of combustion products (e.g., oxides of carbon, sulfur and nitrogen, and other hydrocarbons) and/or dangerously low oxygen levels. Combustion can yield carbon, nitrogen and sulfur oxides.

11. Toxicological Information

Combustible liquid. May be harmful if swallowed. Irritating to eyes, respiratory system, and skin. Keep away from heat, sparks and flame. Avoid exposure - obtain special instructions before use. Potential Health Effects:

Inhalation: Central nervous system depressant. May cause headaches and irritation to the nose, throat, and lungs.

Ingestion: May cause irritation and burning of the gastrointestinal tract (mouth, throat, and stomach.) May cause nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, and restlessness.

Skin Contact: May cause irritation, drying, and cracking of the skin. May cause dermatitis.

Eye Contact: Adverse symptoms may include the following: pain or irritation, watering, redness.

Chronic Exposure: The most common health effect associated with chronic kerosene exposure is dermatitis. Contains material that can cause target organ damage.

Aggravation of Pre-existing Conditions: Pre-existing disorders involving any target organs mentioned in this SDS as being at risk may be aggravated by over-exposure to this product.

Additional Toxicological Information: Benzene may produce blood changes that include reduced platelets, red blood cells, and white blood cells; also aplastic anemia, and acute nonlymphatic leukemia. Benzene has produced fetal death in laboratory animals and caused chromosome changes in humans and mutation changes in cells of other organisms. Health effects attributable to benzene aren't known to occur in humans exposed to kerosene. Kerosene has caused kidney injury in male rats only. No comparable health hazard for kidney disease is known to

occur in humans. An epidemiological study of workers exposed to two isomers of trimethylbenzene had symptoms of nervousness, tension and anxiety, and asthmatic bronchitis. In addition, after inhalation of 60 ppm measured as hydrocarbon vapor, the works' peripheral blood showed a tendency to hypochromic anemia and a deviation from normal in the coagulability of the blood. A lifetime inhalation study in rats did not show any toxic effects even at the high dose of 300 ppm. Behavioral signs of hearing loss were observed in rats exposed to toluene sub chronically at levels of 1000 ppm or more. Comparable effects have not been reported in humans.

Carcinogenicity: Contains material which can cause cancer. Risk of cancer depends on duration and level of exposure.

- Application of hydrodesulfurized kerosene to mouse skin, twice a week for 12 months, resulted in an increased incidence of skin tumors. It has not been identified as a carcinogen by NTP, IARC or OSHA. Naphthalene has been evaluated in two year inhalation studies in both rats and mice. The National Toxicology Program (NTP) concluded that there is clear evidence of carcinogenicity in male and female rats based on increased incidences of respiratory epithelial adenomas and olfactory epithelial neuroblastomas of the nose. NTP found some evidence of carcinogenicity in female mice (alveolar adenomas) and no evidence of carcinogenicity in male mice. Naphthalene has been identified as a carcinogen by IARC.
- Kerosene generally contains benzene which has been designated a carcinogen by the National Toxicology Program (NTP), the International agency for Research on Cancer and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.
- Naphthalene has been evaluated in two year inhalation studies in both rats and mice. The National Toxicology Program (NTP) concluded that there is clear evidence of carcinogenicity in male and female rats based on increased incidences of respiratory epithelial adenomas and olfactory epithelial neuroblastomas of the nose. NTP found some evidence of carcinogenicity in female mice (alveolar adenomas) and no evidence of carcinogenicity in male mice. Naphthalene has been identified as a carcinogen by IARC.

Reproductive Toxicity:

- Hydrodesulfurized kerosene applied to the skin of female rats at 494, 330, or 165 mg/kg daily for 7 consecutive weeks (pre mating, mating, and gestation), or for 8 consecutive weeks in males did not result in systemic, reproductive, or developmental toxicity. This product contains a chemical known to the State of California to cause cancer and birth defects or other reproductive harm.
- Exposure to Kerosene of pregnant rats during gestation to toluene at levels of 250 ppm and higher produces some maternal toxicity and fetotoxicity.

Target Organs: Contains material which causes damage to the following organs: blood, kidneys, liver, skin, central nervous system (CNS,) eye, lens or cornea.

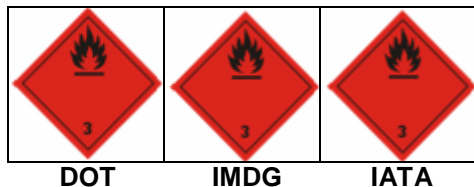

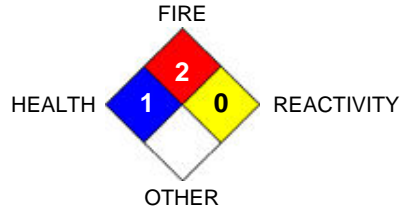
